This seems to be the case for this walking bike, intended for persons with limited endurance in standing up and walking but not inclined to use a wheelchair or a similar mobility device.

We encourage the showing of innovations where readers are challenged to think of new solutions and to give comments to the inventors. Read also the comments attached to the technical note itself.
