His task was not easy, and his activities in the promotion of renewable energy were not always readily accepted.

We congratulate Adnan Amin on his election as Director General of IRENA in Abu Dhabi, and are confident that he will move this organisation toward success.

We hope that the first results of IRENA's work will be seen in December's "Eye on Earth Summit" through which Abu Dhabi's Environment Agency and UNEP will seek to strengthen existing initiatives to provide the best available multi-disciplinary data and information on the state of the environment for decision making at all levels.

It is significant to highlight remarks^{*} made by the Deputy Secretary-General of the United Nations at the closing of the General Assembly's thematic debate on "The Rule of Law and Global Challenges" when she said:

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"The rule of law plays a critical role in preventing conflict and violence, both of which threaten global and regional peace. It is also essential in providing the platform for stable and sustainable economic development".
