

Conference report

14th International Conference on Knowledge-Based and Intelligent Information and Engineering Systems (KES2010), 8-10 September 2010 Cardiff, UK

For over a decade, KES has provided an annual intelligent systems conference for the applied artificial intelligence research community. The conference has been held in Australia, UK, Japan, Italy, New Zealand, Croatia and Chile.

The 14th Annual KES Conference on Knowledge-Based and Intelligent Information and Engineering Systems (KES2010) was held at Mercure Holland House Hotel in Cardiff, UK between 8 and 10 of September 2010. The Conference was organised by the School of Engineering at Cardiff University, in conjunction with KES International. The aim of the Conference was to provide an international scientific forum for the presentation of the results of high-quality research on a broad range of intelligent systems topics.

This year the Conference attracted over 360 submissions from 42 countries and 6 continents: Argentina, Australia, Belgium, Brazil, Bulgaria, Canada, Chile, China, Croatia, Czech Republic, Denmark, Finland, France, Germany, Greece, Hong Kong ROC, Hungary, India, Iran, Ireland, Israel, Italy, Japan, Korea, Malaysia, Mexico, The Netherlands, New Zealand, Pakistan, Poland, Romania, Singapore, Slovenia, Spain, Sweden, Syria, Taiwan, Tunisia, Turkey, UK, USA and Vietnam.

Over 300 scientists and practitioners submitted their papers to 11 main tracks covering generic and specific intelligent systems topics and 29 special sessions organised by Invited Chairs.

The Conference papers were reviewed by a Programme Committee consisting of over 160 reviewers. All papers were rigorously reviewed by two referees that are experts in the field. From the 360 submissions only 240 papers were selected for presentation and inclusion in the proceedings. The accepted papers were published by Springer in volumes 6276-6279 of their Lecture Notes in Artificial Intelligence series edited by Setchi, Yordanov, Howlett and Jain.

The Conference was opened by Rhodri Morgan Assembly Member for Wales, David Grant, Vice Chancellor of Cardiff University, and Karen Holford, Director of its School of Engineering.

The Conference spanned over three days and consisted of 6 plenary sessions and 18 parallel sessions. The

Invited Speakers were Stuart Allen, UK, Christopher Bishop, UK, Nikola Kasabov, New Zealand, Saeid Navahandi, Australia, Tetsuo Sawaragi, Japan and Yuzuru Tanaka, Japan who delivered interesting and informative talks of world-class standard.

The welcome reception on the first day was held at Cardiff Castle while the conference banquet on the second day was at Hilton Cardiff Hotel.

A sub-committee consisting of Anne Hakansson, Ivan Jordanov and Ron Hartung nominated the best research paper, best student paper, best poster and best invited session after wider consultation.

The Best Paper award was given to Katharina Schwarz, Pavel Rojtberg, Joachim Caspar, Iryna Gurevych, Michael Goesele and Hendrik P.A. Lensch from Ulm University and TU Darmstadt, Germany for their paper "Text-to-Video: Story Illustration from Online Photo Collections". Mihaela Cocea from University of London, UK was awarded the Best PhD Student Paper award for her paper "Adaptive Modelling of Users' Strategies in Exploratory Learning Using Case-Based Reasoning" co-authored with Sergio Gutierrez-Santos and George D. Magoulas. Sergio Ciruela, Miguel Delgado and Nicolás Marín from the University of Granada, Spain won the Best Poster Paper award for their work "A Ubiquitous Intelligent Tutoring System for Aiding Electronic Learning". Eunice Ma, N. Antonopoulos, and B. Coyne from the University of Derby, UK received the award for Best Invited Session for organising a workshop on 3D Visualisation of Natural Language.
