Introduction to the Bárány Society XXIII International Congress

Paris, France July 7–9, 2004

The international meetings of the Bárány Society have long been a unique chance for clinicians and basic scientists to exchange facts and ideas concerning the physiology and pathology of the vestibular system and inner ear. Many fruitful interactions have resulted from the juxtaposition of otorhinolaryngologists, neurootologists, neurologists, ophthalmologists, and basic scientists in the open-minded spirit of the Society.
