Agreement on international co-operation

Non-governmental organisations with a focus on rehabilitation and assistive technology from four continents have approved an agreement for international cooperation. Mutual benefits between the organisations and for their members will support international exchange and collaboration between Australia, Europe, Japan and North America.

Four organisations active in the field of technology for people with disabilities approved an agreement on co-operation prepared during the Japanese conference JCART2000 in Tokushima. Following this Tokushima agreement, AAATE (Europe), ARATA (Australia),

Report on the AAATE 2000 Seminar

On the 4th and 5th September 2000, approximately 35 AAATE members met in Hatfield in the UK for the 2000 Seminar and General Assembly. The topic of the seminar was "The potential of the World Wide Web for assistive and rehabilitative technology". To encourage discussion and debate on this important topic, speakers were each given 30 minutes for their presentations and there was 15 minutes after each presentation for questions and discussion. This proved a very successful format with lots of likely discussions.

The seminar started with a fascinating presentation by Mary Watkins from the National Center for Accessible Media in Boston on developments in making multimedia and web presentations accessible to people with visual, hearing and cognitive disabilities, using SMIL formatting of the various media streams. We were entertained with excellent examples of cartoons with sign language interpretation and simplified subtitles, not to mention an audio-described trailer for the latest Star Wars film.

The presentations which followed covered a range of approaches to the potential of the Web for assistive and rehabilitative technology including:

- accessibility of the Web for people with visual disabilities (Colwell and Petrie) and older people (Healey);
- using the Web to create employment opportunities for people with disabilities (Tuszynski), and provide education for people with disabilities (Cooper; Hersh and Ionescu);

- using the Web to collect information about the living conditions of people with disabilities (Bulinska, Markiewicz and Pleszczynska);
- the potential and problems of e-commerce for people with disabilities (Vile; Wesley); and
- using the Web to provide education for professionals about assistive and rehabilitative technology (Turner-Smith).

News of projects and activities by members

FORTUNE Guide on User Participation in Projects is now available

The FORTUNE project (Forum of User Organisations Training and Networking in Europe, EU project DE9231) has presented a guide on empowered participation of users in projects. The guide provides a vision and practical recommendations for implementing user participation of people with disabilities in project work.

After 36 months the European project FORTUNE finished. In this co-operation umbrellas of user organisations and organisations experienced in European research and development from four countries explored a new approach to user participation. Contacts in 17 European countries, the European Disability Forum and AAATE supported this activity. The project dealt with improving participation of users with disabilities in research and development projects. A curriculum for training of users has been elaborated and tested. Practical experiences of the trainees complemented the ed-

ucational approach. The essence of the project experience and vision of the project partners has been summarised in the FORTUNE Guide. It provides an ideal model of user participation consisting of seven principles, criteria for the assessment, hints for an organisational framework and the curriculum for the training. First International Conference on Tactile Diagrams, Maps and Pictures

On 9th and 10th October 2000 approximately 140 delegates from all over the UK and Europe, Canada and the USA gathered in Hatfield for a first conference on tactile diagrams, maps and pictures, organized by the National Centre for Tactile Diagrams. The conference brought together people with a variety of interests in tactile graphics: people who design and produce tactile graphics, people who use tactile graphics in education, museums and business, people developing new equipment for the production of tactile graphics, and people conducting research in the use and effectiveness of tactile graphics. A variety of activities were organized during the conference: presentations, workshops with hands-on experience, panel sessions debating important issues and an exhibition with more than 20 displays.
